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## Developing But Holding BRIMINGTON, near Old Charm Chesterfield, presents a

picture of old England.

THE village's old houses, some of which date back to 1710, are gradually being demolished, however, but the village is developing rapidly with the building of several new housing estates.

This quaint old village is mentioned in Domesday Book and the lodge house to the former Brimington Manor still stands.

The lodge house was originally built 440 years ago, but many years later it was rebuilt by the late Mr. Radford Wetton, who died at the age of 82.

## For 22 Years

The former lodge house, which used to have a thatched roof and now has a tiled one, is owned by Mr. Wetton's widow, who still lives in the village.

Living in the old lodge are 70year-old MR. JOHN TURNER and his wife, who is 77.
